Program Notes

What does it mean to live a meaningful life? All of us aspire to some purpose, even if its nature varies wildly amongst us. Robert Harling wrote Steel Magnolias as a tribute to his sister, Susan Harling Robinson, to the life she chose, the life she left unlived, and to the legacy that she left behind for her young son. The play takes place between 1983 and 1985, and while Chinquapin, Louisiana 35 years ago is a long way from the social media-driven "Me Too" reckoning we are living through today, this play remains a timeless tribute to the strength and power of women. These women possess an independence and freedom that befits a generation beginning to grow outside of the shadow of patriarchy and chauvinism, and while the play is undoubtedly about their fierce friendship, there is also something universal that speaks to the fleeting nature of our time here on earth. It is important to note that an unseen character in this play—the villain perhaps—is the ruthless specter of type 1 diabetes (T1D), an auto-immune disorder that occurs when the body's own immune system attacks and destroys the insulin-producing cells in the pancreas. People with T1D must inject or pump insulin into their bodies every day in order to stay alive. Long-term effects on the body vary, but in some cases, as with Shelby, prolonged high levels of sugar in the blood can damage organs like the kidneys. T1D is distinct from type 2 diabetes, a metabolic disorder that can often be managed with diet, exercise or medication. To this day, T1D it has no known cause or cure. Steel Magnolias celebrates the persistence of our dreams in the face of our precarious lives, the need to grieve in the face of heartbreak, and the necessity of honoring our losses by moving forward. It is a fitting memorial to a life well lived.




We all have the need to see people like ourselves portrayed in the media. To be excluded from media representation is to be, in a very real sense, invisible and unable to fully participate in society. *Hairspray* is about a group of outsiders who go against the status quo not because they want to be famous but, because they want to do the right thing. The events in *Hairspray* are based on and around "The Buddy Dean Show," a local popular music program that aired on WJZ-TV in Baltimore for 2½ hours a day, six days a week between 1957 and 1964. The teen dancers featured were all white, except for every other Friday, when only black teen agers were featured. Dean's show was cancelled before it could integrate the dancers (that distinction went to American Bandstand in 1964 but, only after it moved from Philadelphia to Southern California) however, it inspired both the movie and the musical versions of *Hairspray*, which is the first musical created with a character, Edna, specified by the author to be played in drag.

Program Notes

According to the C.E. Hooper rating service, the Mercury Theatre of the Air's production of War of the Worlds was heard by two percent of the available listening audience. The other ninety-eight percent were tuned into Edger Bergen's Chase and Sanborn Hour, an insanely popular variety show that dominated the radio airwaves every Sunday night. In spite of this disparity, print headlines the following days screamed "Fake Radio War Stirs Terror Through U.S." and a New York Times editorial claimed "Terror by Radio". For two weeks 12,500 articles across the country claimed that people had armed themselves to repel Martian hordes, been hospitalized for hysteria and even committed suicide out of fear of their new Martian over-lords. There were law suits threatened, a congressional investigation, fictional "news flashes" were banned, and Orson Welles apologized. Then the terror ended, Welles left for Hollywood and the myth of the great panic broadcast of 1939 grew until the proof against it, always hidden in plain sight, revealed that the only hoax perpetrated on Halloween in 1938 was that there had ever been any hoax at all. Print media was losing advertising dollars and prestige to the upstart technology of radio, which the newspapers wanted to portray as being too fast, unstable, and unreliable to be trusted as a reliable source of news. Even academia got in on the act, in 1940 Princeton Professor Hadley Cantril wrote Invasion from Mars, which confirmed the panic by cherry-picking survey answers and equating audience members being frightened or disturbed by the fictional broadcast with wide spread panic in the streets. Cantril's book was frequently sighted in other texts for years afterward, even after its methods and whole premise had been debunked and the myth of the panic broadcast continues to this day. Perhaps not so much out of the fear of our planet being invaded and colonized by Martians but, the fear of our minds being invaded and colonized by panic generated by lies and self-promotion.
